## Letter From the President

This spring, Allen and I attended a seminar held by the Federation of Vermont Lakes and Ponds with invasive species as the main topic. We learned many things, and concluded that invasive species are the biggest threat we have to our lakes. Once Eurasian milfoil and other species have been established, they are here to stay. We are fortunate for the early detection of the invasive species which prompted Jeff Wallin to establish the Milfoil Control Program. The program has been vital to limiting the spread of milfoil in our lakes.

The costs involved with any sort of

abatement are escalating. In response, the board has been seeking additional funding. New fund raising projects this year include the silent auction at our annual picnic, which was a huge success, and next spring, the Dunmore Dip. Please read John's article for more information on these two events.

Furthermore, Lorraine and I have been learning how to write grants and will be attending workshops this fall. It is essential that we supplement our budget with some outside funding in addition to the help we get from the State of Vermont and the Towns of Leicester and Salisbury. If anyone has the experience to help educate us in this process it would be greatly appreciated.

Thank you all for continuing to support us. We have a great mem-

bership base; however, it represents only about 71% of total lakes residents. Another one of our initiatives to increase funding is to educate non-members in hopes they will join the association. We encourage all of you to talk to your neighbors. If they are not members, please ask them why or refer them to me so that I can explain the various programs which our dues go to support. The fundraising has become our number one priority, and we appreciate and welcome any suggestions you may have to help raise funds.

Hope you all have a wonderful winter, lots of good ice fishing, and may we get some nice powder and lots of it.

## 2009 Membership & Directory

This year the 2009 Lake Dunmore Fern Lake Association Directory was updated and printed for distribution to all members on our two lakes. We want to thank the Addison County Independent newspaper for taking on the task of soliciting ads, setting up the addresses of the lakes dwellers and publishing the books. Another grateful thank you goes to Lynda Rheame, who coordinated the smooth process of the publishing of the directories. Please contact me if the information regarding you and/or your property is incorrect. We want to make sure we remain as current as possible for 2011.

As of October 2009 we've received

dues from 332 (71%) households, friends and businesses. This is down from the 344 (77%) received in 2008. However, donations were up from 24 in 2008 to 28 people in 2009 with donations ranging from \$5 to \$705. How wonderful! Thank you for your support. When the dues request comes your way next spring, each and every dollar is important to the fiscal health of your organization. Please encourage your friends and neighbors to participate.

Your payment of \$45 per camp or \$135 per business goes toward milfoil control, mosquito control, water quality testing, and water safety. You receive web site maintenance

with the latest LDFLA information, an invitation to the annual picnic with outstanding entertainment, newsletters, bi-yearly directory, and of course, a dock tag for each camp as a show of support for the Association.

## My View of the Lake

Who loves the lake the most? It has to be our dog (and yours). A lake with woods and leaf mold and chipmunks scurrying around – ah, heaven to a dog. Those of us who arrive each weekend know the ritual: the dog starting to sniff as soon as we turn off 53, head out the window, body rotating to look all directions, then bounding from the car the second a door is opened, a little dance for joy on the driveway, and off around camp to the lake. If it's a water dog, maybe it goes straight in, but ours says hello to the lake by lapping up some (umm that's good). If there are waves, she times her tongue to meet incoming ones while balancing and slipping on the larger rocks lining the bank, first one side of the dock and then the other side. Shaking herself all over, she's off to greet the woods: hello pine needles and spongy ground – snort, snort. Oh my goodness, a great scent – paw, paw, dig, dig.

Our neighbors who walk the Kelsey Lane – Indian Trail loop and go by our place, perhaps have seen the memorial stone to our late dog Tripper. She lasted until 19 years of age (That's 133 human years!). The last year of her life, we kept saying through the winter of carrying her outdoors

and getting her moving on her slow daily amble, "I just hope she makes it to go down to camp again." And she did. In April and early May, each time we pulled into camp and lifted her down from the car, she would try to do a little jump for joy, inevitably ending up sprawled on the ground since her back legs just couldn't support her any more. But now she's at the lake permanently, overlooking her domain. Her likeness is carved on her memorial stone (by a young Vermonter in Jericho Center) and is so lovely that my husband said to me when he arrived back home from picking up the finished stone, "I suppose you're going to want one of these too." I admit I can't think of a better place or way to be memorialized.

Now we have a new puppy, rescued from a high kill shelter in South Carolina (and found via Craig's List). I knew she had bonded to us, when only the second time we were at camp, she got away as I was ferrying things from the car into the cabin, but came back in less than 10 minutes, jumping up on the screen door to push it open. Now, each time she gets out alone, she's gone a little longer, expanding her known territory, but comes back in an excited rush, as if to say, "Oh, you should see what I found!"

She's a true mutt – some border collie, maybe some spaniel, something with a swirly over-the-back tail. It all adds up to being the breed called "Cute". She didn't take to going in the lake until she saw a friend's dog repeatedly jump in to fetch a stick. Sure looked like fun, and the puppy would dance right at the edge of the water. Sure enough, eventually she slipped in and had to do a little doggy paddle before she could get out. Don't think she'll earn her swimmer's badge until next summer, but she'll definitely be a camper's success story.

We take a daily training walk on the leash and then let her off close to camp to practice "Here, Tilly" and play hide and seek among the big White Pines. She's making good progress, although it's darn hard to compete with the scent of a little rodent under ground. Since she's getting her molars in, she daily chews up something inappropriate at home. I'd much rather have her at camp, and of course, that's where she'd rather be too. Another devoted Lake Dweller, just like us all.

## Milfoil Control Program

---

There were a lot of returning members to the Milfoil Crew this year. Joe Carr returned as crew chief after three years away. Also returning were veterans Collin Tompkins, Nate Bierschank, and Will Pitkin as well as new recruits David Volz, Brian Bliven, LB Schmidt. The crew also welcomed Robbie Glassford as end of year support.

This season was one of the most challenging we have seen with regard to controlling the spread on Milfoil on our lakes. While we operated with a six person crew most of the season (2 more than in prior years) we still struggled keeping the plant under control. The normal hot spot areas of North Bridge Bay and North Bay on Dunmore and the boat access and the western shore on Fern Lake had significantly heavier growth than in prior years. The midsection of Lake Dunmore from Sucker Brook

down to a point South East of the island also experienced more plants than in past years. Some of the increase in growth was as a result of last years storm but a lot of it is just due to an increase in plants.

The crew is definitely having a significant impact on curtailing the growth but we feel we need to employ some additional strategies to be successful in the future. First off we are going to continue with a 6 person crew and strive to have all members of the crew become scuba certified. Secondly we want to expand our lake resident training program. We conducted two training sessions this season attended by approximately 15 people interested in learning the proper technique to use when pulling Milfoil. To be successful the lakes need as many people as possible to participate in controlling the Milfoil in front of their residences. Our third strategy is "Operation Fragment"; while it

sounds corny the concept can do as much to control the spread on Milfoil as any of our other initiatives. We are encouraging everyone to carry a net to pick up milfoil fragments when they see them while enjoying time on the water. Milfoil spreads as fragments float around the lake. The fragments can get cut off by boat propellers then float down the lake until they start to grow roots (approximately 3 days) and sink to start new plant.

We are going to continue to explore new and more efficient ways to deal with our Milfoil challenge and encourage you to join us in combating this invasive species. As always we look forward to your feedback and ideas.

## 2009 Financial Update

---

Like many business, government, and personal finances in 2009, this has been a challenging year for LDFLA. We experienced a shortfall in revenue when the state milfoil eradication grant fell \$10,000 below expectations and interest income was down \$2000. While the new Silent Auction held at the picnic (many thanks to all who participated) added \$1200, it was a difficult gap to close. At the same time, expenses ran a bit higher than expected. We invested additional dollars in our battle with milfoil (\$4000.) and added the oral history project (\$1000.) to our efforts.

Fortunately, we have the financial strength to withstand bad times. This year I project we will draw approximately \$15,000 from our reserves. The reserves were established specifically to insure the continuation of our milfoil program, even in the face of revenue shortages. While this cannot continue unabated, it seems reasonable to apply the reserves in these times of economic slowdown, particularly as triggered by the reduced state support.

Looking to 2010, our needs will not diminish. The milfoil must be found and pulled. It is an effective program, but we must be

forever vigilant. While the economy is expected to improve, I expect the state budget to continue to be "tight". Thus I expect we will implement a dues increase and request additional funds from the towns as we go through our plans for next year. Our initial goal will be to balance the budget and not draw on reserves. Beginning in 2011, hopefully we can begin to rebuild those same reserves to insure our programs in the future.

## Insect Control

---

*Planning to upgrade your GPS navigation system this holiday season? The BLSG Insect Control District would like your outgrown ones.*

It became apparent during the big mosquito outbreak in August that locating and spraying our twisty, narrow private roads is not an easy task for the District's newest drivers. The drivers concluded that GPS navigation systems pre-programmed with each route would be a great tool for ensuring that all roads are covered whenever a driver goes out to spray.

If your old GPS system can accommodate multiple destinations for a single trip and can store the route from use to use, please contact me at [lbpitkin@comcast.net](mailto:lbpitkin@comcast.net) or call 802.388.3229 so we can discuss your donation in more detail. The donation is tax deductible and the District will pay your

shipping costs, if you wish.

As you make your fall repairs and plan your spring projects, please keep in mind that the mosquito trucks, as well as emergency vehicles such as ambulances and fire trucks, need a well-lit, unobstructed path to your property. Please consider installing motion-detector lights outdoors, especially if you are at the end of your road or at any other challenging part of a road where the driver needs to make a difficult maneuver. Make sure branches are trimmed all along your road out to the main road and give careful consideration to where your cars are parked and where your grills, boat trailers, and other "toys" are stored in your yard. Because of the nature of the materials and the top-heavy loads they are carrying, drivers have been given total discretion about what places they should spray – if they don't feel

it is safe, they do not have to spray.

If you live in an area that has proven particularly tricky for the drivers and are willing to spend some daylight time with a driver to discuss his concerns and yours, please contact me at [lbpitkin@comcast.net](mailto:lbpitkin@comcast.net) or call 802.388.3229. This is a terrific opportunity for you to point out areas along your road you feel haven't been well-covered. It is also a great opportunity for you to learn what the drivers' concerns are and to discuss possible changes you can make to your property to improve access. # Boating Safety

A Boaters' Safety Course was held on June 27 by the Middlebury Recreation Department in conjunction with the American Legion post in Middlebury. Thanks go to Tom Scanlon for organizing this event.

Please remind renters and visitors to the lake that Vermont State law requires:

Life jackets must be carried in all moving vessels, and must be

worn at all times when on the water by children under 12.

Boats go no faster than 5mph within 200 feet of a swimmer, another boat or the lake shore.

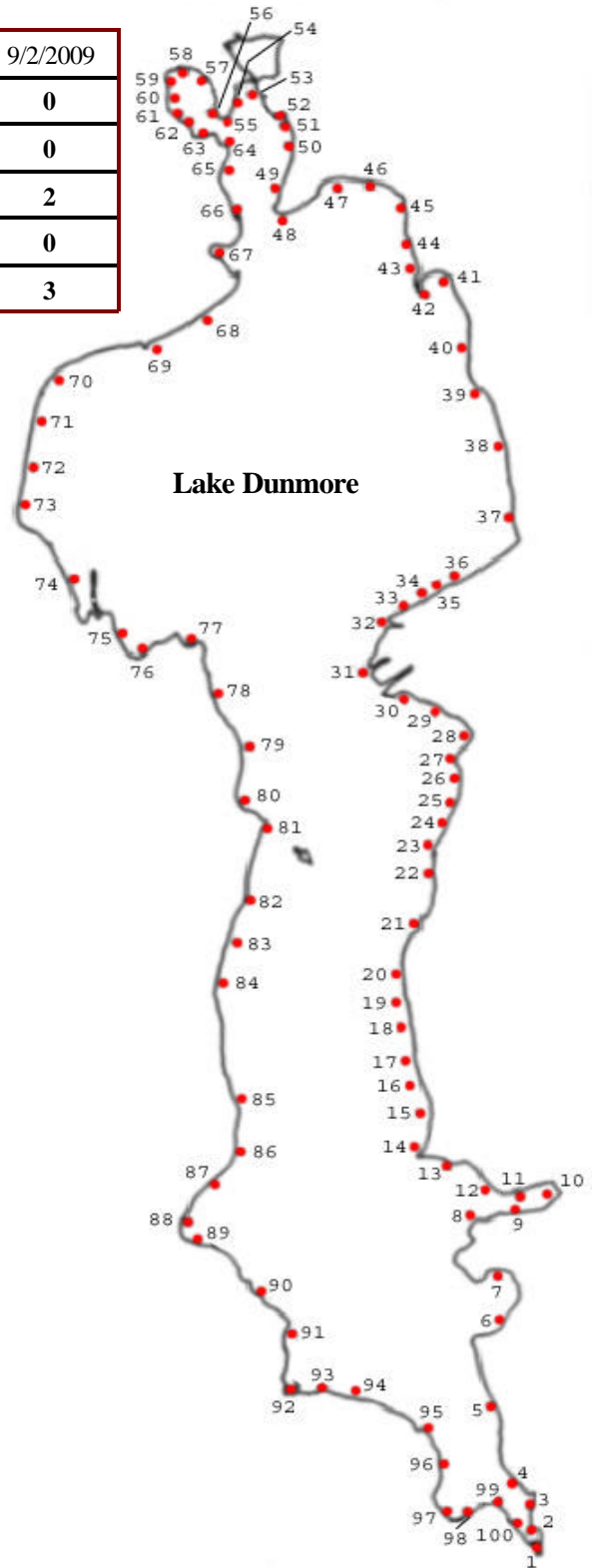
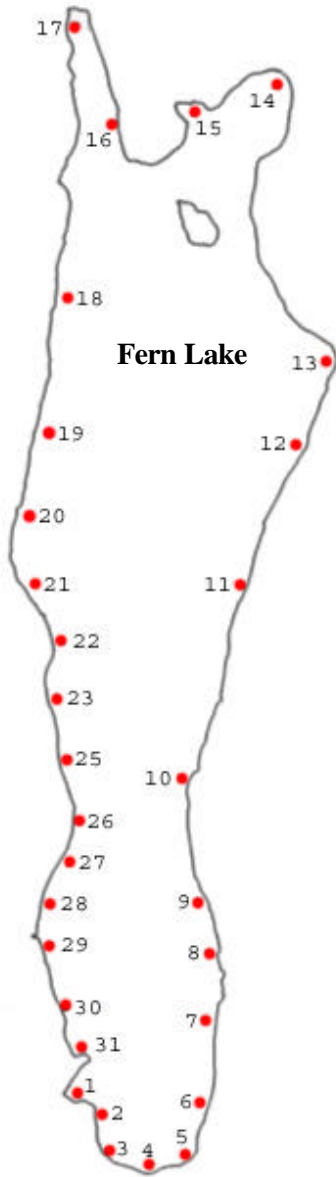
